OPTIONAL NEXT STEP: START A 21-DAY FOOD-CHANGE TRACKING PLAN

Keep one planned change steady, record scheduled check-ins and any unplanned foods, and create a dated pattern to share with your veterinarian. The Vetica plan helps organize observations; it is not the same as a formal veterinarian-guided elimination diet.

- Choose one focused food change and keep everything else as steady as practical.
- Record symptoms, food changes, unplanned exposures, and any repeat tests at scheduled check-ins.
- Reintroduce an item only when appropriate under the plan or veterinary guidance.
- Finish with a dated report to discuss with your veterinarian.

When to contact a veterinarian

Contact your veterinarian whenever you are concerned. Seek prompt care if any of these appear:

- Blood or a lot of mucus in the poop
- Throwing up repeatedly, or unable to keep water down
- Not eating at all for more than a day
- Very low energy, weakness, or hard to wake
- A tense, painful, or swollen belly
- Trouble breathing or blue-tinged gums
- Collapse, a seizure, or inability to stand
- Possible toxin or foreign-object ingestion

For trouble breathing, collapse, seizure, or suspected poisoning, contact the nearest emergency veterinary clinic.

Questions for your veterinarian

- How should this result be considered alongside what I am seeing at home?
- Could Bailey's loose poop or diarrhea and gas or gurgly tummy have another explanation?
- Should we keep the current food steady, or would a veterinarian-guided food trial be appropriate?
- What should we continue monitoring or repeat, if anything?
